We have overcome the challenges and continued to provide top level service to our residents while keeping them safe.

The Port Moody Police Board members and the Port Moody Police Department did an exceptional job in 2019. The Port Moody Police Department continues to

exceed all expectations in the work they do, going above and beyond the call of service. Their community outreach and engagement is apparent in many aspects of Port Moody, through their participation in public events, campaigns, and day-to-day engagement with our residents – including visiting lemonade stands and escorting Santa around town.

The Police Board had a busy year, accomplishing what they needed to do and more. The Port Moody Police Board co-hosted, with the Abbotsford Police Board, the annual BC Association of Police Boards Conference and Annual General Meeting in Harrison Hot Springs Resort. More than 120 people attended this conference and it was great to see such collaboration between the boards in hosting this event. The Police Board also started their strategic planning process.

Looking forward to 2020, I know we will see some unprecedented times. I know it will be a busy year for our Police Board as we continue to work on our strategic plan, with the goal to have it completed before year end. I know our residents will be well looked after from our Port Moody Police Department in the work that they do, through addressing ongoing concerns such as property crime, domestic violence, mental health and addiction issues, and motor vehicle enforcement for speeding, distracted/impaired driving and driving safety. Welcome to our 2019 Community Report! Our members, staff, and volunteers are all incredibly proud of the Port Moody Police Department! 2019 was another exceptional year for public safety in our city.

We are most proud of our community outreach and engagement. Along with high visibility patrols and significant participation in Port Moody's public events, we held a number of successful community campaigns. In the spring, the #pmpdROCKS campaign was created, a sort of scavenger hunt activity for children. Twenty beautifully painted rocks were discreetly hidden throughout city

trails. Once found, the rocks were returned for a prize and the chance to meet and take a photo with an officer. Over the summer, our members participated in the second year of our #CopsLoveLemonade program, visiting children's lemonade stands throughout the city. December saw the introduction of our #HereComesSanta initiative, a parade through various areas over six nights. Eighteen volunteers worked on this campaign, walking over 25,000 steps each night and collecting over 2,500 pounds of food and toys for SHARE Society! On a provincial level, the Port Moody Police Board co-hosted a successful BC Association of Police Boards conference and annual general meeting in partnership with the Abbotsford Police Board.

Another 2019 highlight was local implementation of the 529 Garage bike registry. The goal of this online registry is to make bike theft less attractive to thieves. While Police are able to recover many of the bikes stolen each year, only about 10 per cent are returned to owners due to lack of ownership records. In 2019 we were able to register over 200 bikes, which means there is a much greater chance bike thieves will be caught and bikes will be returned to their rightful owners.

Port Moody Police Department is pleased with the crime statistics for 2019. In comparison to other jurisdictions, Port Moody had the lowest crime rate (per 1000 population) in all categories. We are very proud of the fact that Port Moody crime rates are less than half the average rate experienced across the Lower Mainland. Specifically, thefts from automobiles were down 27 per cent and theft of automobiles decreased by 7 per cent. Compared to 2018, we experienced an increase (2.76 per cent) in our overall calls for service, and crimes against persons increased by 24 incidents over last year.

Road safety continues to be a top local priority. The number of formal written traffic warning notices increased by 29 per cent over 2018 data. Over 1,800 violation traffic fine tickets were issued and we conducted 230 impaired driving investigations, an increase of 3 per cent over 2018.

I could not be more proud of our members, staff, volunteers, and citizens for their dedication to public safety. This community is committed to crime prevention through a number of strategies and I believe no other police department has better support from the community!




