POLICE BOARD CHAIR



On behalf of the Police Board, I'm pleased to share the 2022 Port Moody Police Community Report with you. We're midway through the Department's current strategic plan and I am proud of the progress achieved so far. We remain committed to executing the actions articulated in this plan, which will help us to meet the changing needs and expectations of our community.

Highlights from 2022 include the hiring of 12 new recruits and exempt members – the most ever in a single year. The Department added e-bikes to its fleet to enhance park and lake patrols, and introduced

"Sergeant Scarecrow" – a two-dimensional, life-like cut-out of a police officer holding a speed radar gun – to encourage drivers to slow down. PMPD also collaborated with the City to offer a variety of safety workshops for the public.

The Department relies heavily on volunteers throughout the year. In 2022, we recruited 15 new volunteers who are making valuable contributions to the Victim Services and Crime Prevention units. Thank you to all the volunteers who are helping to build a stronger, safer community.

As COVID-19 restrictions were removed, the Police Board was able to transition back to inperson meetings. We welcomed two new board members: Olga Kuznetsova, vice-president of financial services for TransLink, and Darren Radford, a change leader and business and digital transformation specialist. Mary Vellani, a professional in the financial services industry, completed her six-year term, the maximum allowable for a board member. We were pleased to be able to thank Mary for her years of service and wish her well in future endeavours.

Port Moody consistently ranks as one of the safest communities in B.C. This is, in part, because of the values shared by the Department, from the police officers and civilian staff to the volunteers and board members. Our values – respect, courage, integrity, trust, and transparency – guide our choices in everything we do. I'm extremely proud of the work done by the PMPD. The information contained in this report reflects the Department's dedication to its mission: to serve and protect the community of Port Moody, with excellence.

The Port Moody Police Board is responsible for providing oversight and direction to the Police Department in accordance and consistent with the Police Act. The Board works with the Chief Constable and the Senior Management Team to develop and approve the departments strategic plan, annual plans, budget and objectives and policies.

You will see that our 2022 crime statistics are starting to get back to pre-pandemic levels. Most notably, 2022 saw a significant increase in the number of impaired drivers taken off our roads. Often, this is related more to an increased police focus on a specific area, and I am proud of the increased capacity and enforcement efforts from our PMPD members and staff.



As you can imagine, there is an ever-changing landscape of policing and social issues faced by any community. Port Moody residents remain actively engaged through volunteering, community connections, and an ongoing commitment to public safety. The PMPD's partnership with our residents serves the community well; Port Moody is consistently ranked as one of the safest communities in B.C. and this is a tribute to the people who live and work here.

The PMPD continues to focus on service and we make every effort to go beyond simply responding to a crime. We are proud of the fact that we prevent more crimes than we respond to. 


CRIMES AGAINST PERSON


